1) Evidence for link between poverty and child maltreatment subtypes

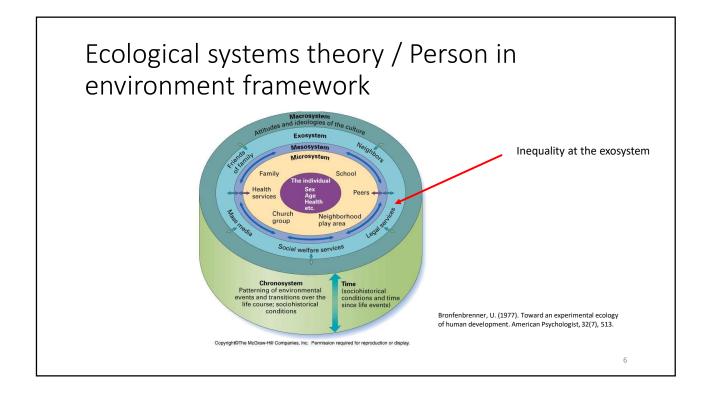
- strong for physical abuse and neglect

2) Increased odds of reported incidents for poor families

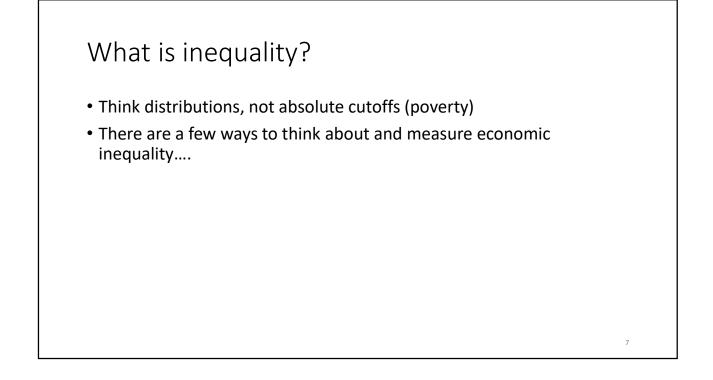
- biased reporting?

Takeaway 3Subtypes of maltreatment

Physical abuse

- Remember: Strong link between poverty and physical abuse
- Consistent findings that inequality relates to physical abuse
- Stress is the likely mechanism

Other subtypes

- Findings are less consistent
- Surprising given the strong link between neglect and poverty

Other takeaways

Subjective measures

- play an important role in research on inequality
- include both subjective and objective measures

Racial and ethnic differences

- Either no racial disparities or
- Whites more affected by inequality if controlled for individual poverty (*Putnam-Hornstein et al., 2022; Schneider and Schenck-Fontaine, 2022; Cai, 2022*)

• Urgent need to expand research on the topic beyond the US!

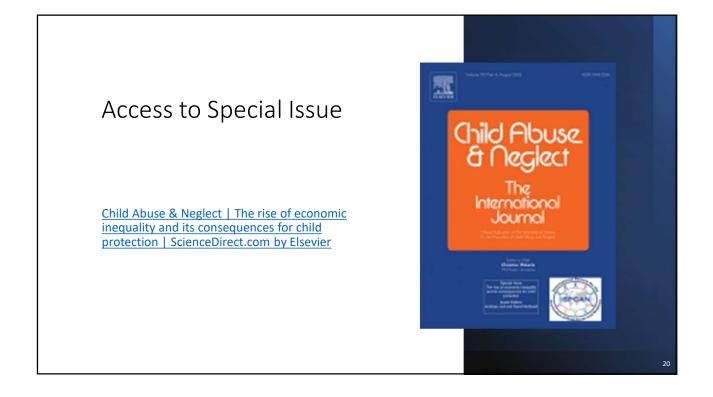
